# CHAPLAIN'S CORNER Tom Varner, KCCH

What's in a name? I have been thinking a lot lately about the Book of Genesis, especially the stories of Enoch and the other Patriarchs. Our 13th Degree, the Royal Arch of Solomon, tells the Masonic legend of how God revealed his ineffable name to Enoch, who inscribed it on a gold plate set on a cubical stone. He then buried it at the bottom of a deep vault for safekeeping, as God had revealed to him the impending Great Flood and destruction of the world. This holy location, later named Mount Moriah, was where Abraham was about to sacrifice his son Isaac, where David met and appeased the Destroying Angel, and where King Solomon built his majestic Temple many centuries later.

It was there, while exploring the ancient ruins under the Temple, that three of King Solomon's architects rediscovered the lost name. We see again and again in the Bible the importance of a name. After God had established his covenant with Abram, which means "exalted father", he changed his name to Abraham, which means "Father of a multitude". When Jacob was at Mahanaim, he wrestled all night with God and, as a result of

this divine encounter, his name was changed to Israel, meaning "he who struggles with God". When Israel in return asked for His name, God declined to give it.

When Moses met God at the burning bush, he asked His Name and God said, "I am that I am", meaning He was the God of the past, present, and future, the only God, the one who always "is", the one who is always present. In the Book of Judges, Samson's father meets an angel and asks his name, only to receive "Why do you ask my name. It is beyond understanding." One more example is when Saul meets the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus and his name is changed to Paul.

What do all of these stories have in common? What can we learn from them as Masons? They were signs from God that these people were starting a new life, that He had blessed them, that they would never be the same again, and that there were new and higher expectations of them. In each of our Craft degrees, the candidate is raised from the altar with a new name, as befits his new status in receiving additional light. We know that names have power, that names give us control, that they give us something to look up to. Let us strive to conduct ourselves to be worthy of the name of Master Mason, and to pray for the blessings of God on ourselves and our families. As St. Timothy said, "Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved, a craftsman who does not need to be ashamed".
